## RESEARCH PROJECTS

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**Therese Cory** is working on mental being in Albert for a paper on mental being in the 13th century as well as on “Albert’s Self-Knowing Soul” for a volume on *Albert and the Human Being*, edited by Bernhard Blankenhorn and Katja Krause (in progress). She is also working on a paper in which Albert figures prominently on the “Problem of the Substrate of Thought in Medieval Philosophy” for a volume on *Thinking as Being in the History of Philosophy*.

**Urban Hannon** will be starting his doctorate in Fall 2024 under **Fr. Bernhard Blankenhorn** at the University of Fribourg. The working title of his dissertation is “*Comedite Bonum*: The Good in St. Albert the Great’s Eucharistic Theology.” He is also working on a conference presentation on Albert’s theology of priestly sacrifice, as well as a book chapter comparing and contrasting Albert’s and Aquinas’s Mass-commentaries.

**Daniel Knapp** (Julius-Maximilians-Universität Würzburg / Albertus Magnus Institute) is working on a dissertation whose working title is “Happiness as Practical and Theoretical Self-Knowledge in Albertus Magnus’s Second *Ethics* Commentary.”

**Maria Evelina Malgieri** is preparing an annotated translation with doctrinal introduction of Albert the Great’s *De causis et processu universitatis a Prima Causa*, Treatise 1, to appear in late 2025 within the series “Biblioteca Filosofica di Quaestio” published by Edizioni di Pagina.

**Jörn Müller** (Julius-Maximilians-Universität Würzburg) in collaboration with **Daniel Knapp** (Julius-Maximilians-Universität Würzburg / Albertus Magnus Institute) is working on the project “Happiness as a key concept of Ethics in Albertus Magnus. Philosophical Analysis and Critical Edition of the First Book of His Second *Ethics* Commentary (“Ethica”). The project, which has initially been approved for two years, is funded by the Fritz Thyssen Foundation and the Albertus Magnus Institute.

**Irven M. Resnick** plans to spend September 2024-February 2025 as a senior research fellow at the Research Alliance Ruhr, College for Social Sciences and Humanities (Essen, Germany). His research will investigate Albert the Great on Health, Disease, and Disability.

**Irven M. Resnick** and **Kenneth F. Kitchell, Jr.**, are preparing a complete, annotated translation of Thomas of Cantimpré's *De natura rerum* for the Catholic University of America Press, Fathers of the Church Medieval Continuations Series, to appear in two volumes in late 2025.

**Mercedes Rubio** has been invited to participate in the upcoming international conference on Maimonides and Aquinas, being organized by the Pontifical Institute of Medieval Studies and the University of Toronto, to be held from May 5-7, 2024. She will spend the month of May as Visiting Scholar at the PIMS, where she will be working on three articles: a first regarding Albert's views on the role of sign in man's cognoscitive structure, a second on the adept intellect as an outcome of the acquisition of intellectual habits in Albert's theory of knowledge, and third on the active intellect according to Albert.

**Mercedes Rubio** has been invited to participate in a week-long seminar on the philosophy of language of L. Polo, organized by the International Center for the Research of the Spanish Language (CILENGUA), to be held in the Monastery of Yuso, La Rioja (Spain) on Dec. 9-13, 2024.

**Sr. Albert Marie Surmanski, OP**, is working on an English translation of Albert's *De Sacramentis* for the Catholic University of America Press, Fathers of the Church Medieval Continuations Series.

**David Torrijos-Castrillejo** is working on a Spanish translation of the chapter on beauty from Albert's *Commentary on the Divine Names*. His work is part of a research project entitled "Traducción de textos medievales sobre estética" that has been underway in the Faculty of Philosophy of the Universidad Eclesiástica San Dámaso (Madrid) since 2020.

**Marcin Trepczyński** (with collaborators **Andrea Nannini** and **Marcin Będkowski**) is carrying out a project from 2021-2023 entitled "Reasoning in Biblical Exegesis: From Stephen Langton to Thomas Aquinas." The project focuses on the Biblical commentaries written by Stephen Langton, Robert Grosseteste, Albert the Great, Bonaventure, and Thomas Aquinas.

**Paul M.J.E. Tummers** is working on an English translation and analysis of Albert the Great's *Super Euclidem*, including a comparison with other Euclid-versions of the 13th-century. A first draft has been finished and the final draft may be ready in the near future.
